Dear Families,

Thank you for your continued partnership with the school to engage your children in the remote learning tasks set. The teachers are constantly in praise of your great work. For this we are very grateful.

As I write this today, I think it is important to inform you of the multiple closures of primary and secondary schools in our area due to Covid 19 cases, contact tracing and cleaning processes. I would like to thank the families of essential workers, vulnerable students and special needs students for their diligence to inform the school of cases in their work places, and for the responsibility you have taken to protect the onsite school students and staff. This is certainly a testament to our sense of "community" and being in this together.

**If you or your family have tested positive for Covid-19 please inform the school, whether you are onsite or remote learning.**

A reminder to all families that there are only 3 reasons your children may attend school, in the metro Melbourne and Mitchell Shire, as set by the Premier of the State, Department of Education and Catholic Education Melbourne:

1. Essential Worker and validation of this is with a letter from your employer
2. Vulnerable student: Family violence
3. Special Needs.

For all other families you must educate your children at home using the remote learning tasks set by teaching staff. I understand this is by no means easy, but the directive is clear. I would appreciate your understanding and acknowledgement of this.
